President's Remarks

Introduction

The AMA appreciates all they have contributed to our ongoing success.

I also want to recognize the new officers: Jim Murdoch as Vice-President, Matthew Minerd as Secretary and Webmaster, and Travis Dumsday as General Editor (after acting as assistant GE for Giuseppe for a number of years). Due to personal reasons Daniel Wagner had to step down as treasurer. Francisco Plaza will be the acting Treasurer. We will revisit this office at our next meeting.

CFP: 2023 Conference

As my first order of business, I am happy to present the call for papers for out 46th Annual Meeting. (See below in the Newsletter.) Our next conference, to be hosted by the University of Dallas, coincides with the fiftieth anniversary of the death of Jacques Maritain on April 28, 1973. It is only appropriate, therefore, that the theme of the conference is "Commemorating the"

Legacy of Jacques Maritain on the Fiftieth Anniversary of His Death."



The late Jude Dougherty was effusive in his estimation Maritain's influence: "As a model of the philosopher working within the Catholic faith and drawing upon antiquity and the Middle Ages, principally Aquinas, to address contemporary issue, Maritain is likely to be unsurpassed. In the twentieth century he preeminently represented the philosophia perennis and has thereby earned the accolade of 'doctor of the Church." We students of Maritain seek to emulate this model by cultivating the wisdom of the perennial tradition in response to the challenges the modern world continues to throw at us. Maritain's legacy, then, is not a nostalgic curation of past philosophies, but an intrepid engagement with the world of ideas, an engagement grounded in the confidence in Truth that only faithfilled reason can provide.

Plenary Speakers for 2023

Our commemoration of Maritain's legacy will reflect the breadth of topics in which he exercises ongoing importance for contemporary Catholic thought. The question of relationship of faith and reason will be the topic for William Sweet of St Francis Xavier University, Nova Scotia, and former President of the Canadian Maritain Association. Noted poet and scholar James Matthew Wilson, of the University of St. Thomas, Houston, will consider Maritain's aesthetics. The political philosophy of Maritain will be discussed by Brad Lewis of The Catholic University of America. And the wider implications of Maritain's social teaching will be addressed by Timothy B. Shah, founder of the Jacques and Raïssa Maritain Program on Catholicism, Public Life, and World Affairs at the University of Dallas.

Upgrading our Web Presence

Apart from the conference, we seek to generate involvement in the AMA through these newsletters and the website. We recognize that over the past few years Covid has been a great impediment for members trying to stay involved in the conferences. So, to

As we approach the fiftieth anniversary of the death of Jacques Maritain, I want to offer for your consideration his own thoughts about those who have passed to eternal life: "There is something which scandalizes me: it is the manner in which Christians speak of their deceased.

They call them the dead—they have not been capable of renewing the miserable human vocabulary on a point which nevertheless concerns the essential data of their faith. The dead! ... As if they weren't billions of times more living than we! As if the fundamental truth stated in the Preface of the Burial Mass: vita mutatur, non tollitur—life is changed, it is not taken away—was itself a dead truth." In commemorating the anniversary of Jacques Maritain's death, we must keep in mind that both Jacques and his legacy are indeed alive!

A WORD FROM MARITAIN....

"It should be noted that Saint Paul makes professors play a central role in the spread of [this] sickness. A time will come, he tells us (2 Tim 4:3–4), when men will be taken in tow by a crowd of *didaskaloi* because their ears will itch. In other words, this sickness—which is very contagious, to judge from appearances—will have its breeding ground among the experts or professors. And the itching in the ears will become so general that no one will be able to hear the truth any longer, and men will turn to fables—*epi tous muthous*, writes St. Paul, to myths. But hold on, aren't these the precious myths on which we are gorging ourselves? Of course they are, but they are not the great venerable myths of the youth of mankind. Our craving is for myths of decay, a sterile and synthetic lot (the work of professors)—in particular the myths of demythologizing....

In one form or another, it is always the adoration of the ephemeral, whether to be devoured by it, or to accept, with eyes closed, what it has engendered (in the line of decent leading to him) up to the time he enters the list himself.

By being concerned for truth, and by grasping it, the spirit transcends time. To make the things of the spirit pass under the law of the ephemeral—which is the law of matter and the purely biological—to act as if the spirit were subject to the lord of the flies, is the first sign, the first major symptom of the sickness denounced by Saint Paul"

Commemorating the Legacy of Jacques Maritain on the Fiftieth Anniversary of His Death

THE 46th Annual Meeting of the American Maritain Association

Thursday, April 27 to Saturday, April 29, 2023 Hosted by the University of Dallas, Irving, TX

April 28, 2023, marks the fiftieth anniversary of the death of Jacques Maritain. We therefore take this opportunity to reflect on the significance of Maritain's thought in his own day and its continued relevance for Catholic thinkers in ours. Like his great teachers, Aristotle and Thomas Aquinas, Maritain himself embraced a "supreme docility to the lessons of the real [that ground] the principles and the scale of values" (Degrees of Knowledge, xiv) in the full spectrum of intellectual inquiry, from science and politics to art and theology. Maritain's dedication to the unity of wisdom based in being is a model for contemporary scholars in their work to overcome both the groundless idealism of modern philosophy and the overspecialization that obscures the integrity of human experience.

Accordingly, we invite proposals for papers in any area of philosophy considering how Maritain influenced the development of Catholic and Thomistic thought in the twentieth century and how his contribution to the *philosophia perennis* inspires continued efforts to align man with reality. We also invite papers on any topic in which the perennial philosophy engages issues of contemporary debate.



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An Yves R. Simon Reader is the first collection of texts from the entirety of the philosopher's work.

In An Yves R. Simon Reader: The Philosopher's Calling, Michael D. Torre provides an erudite and helpful introduction to Simon's life and thought. The volume contains selected key texts from all of Simon's twenty books, half of which were published posthumously. The selections are long enough to be substantive and contain sustained and complete arguments. Each selection has its own foreword by an eminent commentator, familiar with Simon's work, who lays out the necessary context for the reader.

The hallmarks of his work—his careful conceptual analysis, his genius for finding undervalued examples, and his talent for creating expressions that revivified an outworn idea—are on display throughout. Indeed, as one of the book's contributors says, Simon touched nothing that he did not adorn. The result is a highly readable introduction to the thought of a key and underappreciated modern philosopher.





ST. THOMAS AQUINAS, always distinguishing, asserts that wisdom takes three forms: that of love, which comes from the Holy Spirit; that of faith, which emanates from revelation; and that of reason, which develops into metaphysics and measures the natural order. In *The Wisdom of Faith: An Introduction to Theology*, Charles Journet considers the second form of wisdom and conducts a study of *sacra doctrina*, the teachings of divine revelation. Following the Angelic Doctor, Journet traces the nature, purpose, and practice of the theological science from the necessary truths imparted to the human race by divine revelation.


ABOUT THE AUTHOR

FROM SACRED SCRIPTURE TO THE SUMMA THEOLOGIAE, the silent wisdom of the *via negativa* has inspired what Charles Journet calls the "*unknowing* of love and the ignorance that is truly *learned*." The Dark Knowledge of God conducts a concise overview of the apophatic tradition with a series of intriguing meditations on the divine nature. In entering into the awesome mystery of God himself, we encounter all other mysteries in their true depth.

Moving nimbly from metaphysics to mysticism, Journet clarifies the key insight of the apophatic tradition—that we can neither speak nor stay silent about God—in such a way as to allow the dark mystery of God to shine as a light on the path of Truth.

"This Name, ineffable here below, the elect shall know by being born again to eternal life. God, Who alone can pronounce it fully, will impart It to them; he will Himself form his name within them. 'If we could know the divine essence as It is in Itself,' St. Thomas says, 'and name it by Its proper name, we would express It by one unique name...'. It will not be a sonorous name which might be uttered in some human language; it will be a name of fire and of light, a spiritual name, a name that sustains and invades the heart of man. This Name will be pronounced in the hearts of the elect and of the angels (immersed in It like a sponge in the sea) by the divine essence Itself. And this Name will of Itself be able to show forth all the transparency and all the fulness of the divine essence. But no creature will in fact ever possess it to the point of exhausting Its content or of circumscribing Its wealth; for to know absolutely all that God is, it is necessary to be absolutely all that God is."



THE TRINITY is the central mystery of the Christian faith. What can we say about the divine nature, and what does it mean to say that God is Father, Son, Holy Spirit, three persons who are one in being? In this book, best selling author Thomas Joseph White, OP, examines the development of early Christian reflection on the Trinity, arguing that essential contributions of Patristic theology are preserved and expanded in the thought of Thomas Aquinas.

By focusing on Aquinas' theology of the divine nature as well as his treatment of divine personhood, White explores in depth the mystery of Trinitarian monotheism. The Trinity: On the Nature and Mystery of the One God also engages with influential proposals of modern theologians on major topics such as Trinitarian creation, Incarnation and crucifixion, and presents creative engagements with these topics. Ultimately any theology of the cross is also a theology of the Trinity, and this book seeks to illustrate how the human life, death, and resurrection of Jesus reveal the inner life of God as Trinity.
